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Dear Fellow Angry Skipper Combat Veterans, Families, and Friends,

In thinking about the introductory note for our annual newsletter, I reflect on President John F Kennedy's 1961 inaugural address that inspired our generation to see the importance of civic action and public service. I am sure you recall them –

"Ask not what your country can do for you – ask what you can do for your country."

So, when the draft call came, and orders for Vietnam – we, the Angry Skipppers - served, sacrificed, mourned our combat dead - and came home to a country deeply divided.

We were the generation of combat veterans that the nation did not value. We came home quietly bearing in our hearts the grief and anguish for our wounded, and our lost combat brothers. We knew their families and local communities buried them - the sons, brothers, husbands, and cousins – again mostly quietly. Only years later did America honor it's fallen publicly at the Vietnam Memorial Wall and recognized their supreme sacrifices.

This year we honored thirty-four young men, of which 21 were Angry Skippers. They were among our nation's best, who died for our country on that fateful day of 10 May 1972 in a Chinook helicopter crash in Long Thanh Province. The Chinook was bound for Vung Tau – the First Cavalry R&R Center. These thirty-four have haunted our memories -- -knowing it could have been any of us. Fifty years, later, to the day, we conducted a special Memoriam Ceremony at the Vietnam Wall in Washington DC. to honor these Never Forgotten 34 in a special way. We wanted to recognize them as war heroes, and to share with the Families of these Fallen their soldiers' stories, pictures, and video clips celebrating lives well lived – and the dreams they never realized.

It has been a half century since the Angry Skippers conducted the last combat patrols in Vietnam in 1972. 50 years have flown by and some of us are lucky to witness the end of 2022 – and are now looking forward to our Phoenix Reunion in May of 2023.

As our Angry Skipper numbers dwindle, I think we have one more mission ahead of us before the Good Lord embraces us in his folds. That is, we need to Walk Point for the next generation and inspire them. I suggest, we have a *SPECIAL OBLIGATION TO REACH OUT TO THE NEXT GENERATION* to teach and encourage them that our nation needs to continue to honor all our war heroes, veterans, and those that currently serve - and their families - for their willingness to defend our Freedoms and make sacrifices on behalf of our nation. *Service to the Nation – however small - is the right thing to do.*

On May 9-10, 2022, a 2-day memorial event was conducted in Washington, DC. to honor the 34 soldiers who perished in the Chinook crash of 10 May 1972. All 34 Gold Star Families were contacted and invited to attend, including two surviving Gold Star mothers. Approximately 180 attended, including Gold Star family members and Angry Skippers & their families. Special guests included two vets representing the Aviation units, including the Chairman of the Accident Investigation Board, one veteran from 1st/12th Cav., and Dr. John Osheroff, attending physician at the crash site.

The event began with a Gold Star Families & Veterans Gathering Dinner, a time for sharing stories, memories, photos, memorial quilts for each fallen soldier, memorabilia, etc. The following day, a military memorial ceremony was conducted at the Vietnam Memorial Wall, including the reading of names and a bell toll for each of the fallen, followed by the laying of wreaths and playing of Taps, 50 years to the day and hour of the crash.

Gold Star Family members and veterans alike described the memorial events as very moving, powerful, and healing. Families were reunited, some after many years. Families who felt forgotten in their grief now realize their loved one has never been forgotten, not even after 50 years. For many veterans, hugging the family members of their fallen brothers healed old wounds in ways they had never known to be possible.

In 2021 the family of Spec 4 Donald Edward Howell, received a call from Never Forgotten 34 informing the family of a memorial to be held on May 20, 2022. This memorial would be a tribute to 34 Heroes that lost their lives in a helicopter crash enroute to an R&R site on May 20, 1972. This call came as a surprise to us, due to the fact that Donald's death happened 49 years ago. Questions came into our minds: Who was Never Forgotten 34? Why are they bringing his death up after nearly 50 years, and why were they doing this? We felt that if the event was truly presented as explained to us then it would be a good thing and an opportunity for us to find out what happened with soldiers that Donald served with. We were so excited that finally we would be able to speak with individuals that served with our brother and could maybe just reassure us that his death was quick and he did not have to suffer.

Skip and Linda Howell, along with Ed and Joyce Hooke attended the Memorial. During the Monday evening Gathering event, the soldiers and their family members made us feel at home in a manner that relieved the tension of not really knowing anyone or what is going to happen next. The Angry Skipper Association, as we know them now, put on a program that included every aspect of what the unit's duty was, how the accident happened, and for us, the most important of all was learning that they did not suffer. All through the event a slide presentation of the Never Forgotten 34 was on-going with photos of each of the 34 fallen heroes on display.

On Tuesday, we were transported to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall for the Memorial Ceremony where a family member of each of the 34 fallen soldiers was given the honor to call the name of their own hero as a bell was tolled. The walk to the WALL in single file came with tears and as we marched by, veteran groups standing at attention presented the Gold Star Family members with the Military Hand Salute, Taps was sounded, and flags were presented. What A Day.

Once we returned home, we talked about the event in DC with other family members who could not attend due to

sickness. It seemed that our way of thinking about our brother's death was that it was for a cause and maybe for more than one cause. One is the cost of Freedom, another maybe a cause to get so many family members in one place at the same time to share our grief. And maybe the most Important of all was the opportunity for a lot of soldiers so dedicated to the cause that they formed the Angry Skipper Association.

When Wolf Cutter first left a voicemail about the never forgotten 34, I thought it was potential spam. How would anyone from the military know my number? The evening of the event, hearing from the doctor that arrived on the scene to treat our fallen brothers, was incredibly heartbreaking. As I had heard different versions of the event growing up, hearing in exact detail the reason for the crash provided enlightenment. When handed the handmade quilt in memory of Gary and his service, I felt truly honored.


The ceremony at the wall was one of the hardest events of my life. When you arrive at the wall, your mood is

My heart is full and my personal mission complete from finally sharing the videos Gary took of his fallen brothers. Till the day I leave this world, the Angry Skippers will be a lifesaving family.

Every day since the crash I had thoughts and felt haunted about that day. When I saw the families of my brothers that gave the ultimate sacrifice it was as close as I could imagine being there with my friends again. We celebrated their lives together and talked about stories of some of the last times we remember that are still so clear to this day. I believe this event gave me the needed closure in a way that was healthy for me as I no longer think of the bad memories and instead, they are replaced with the memories of the memorial and seeing the families that loved these men so dearly. For that I am thankful.

The Never Forgotten 34 memorial meant the same to other vets as it did for me. When I spoke to other vets in attendance they were impacted just as much as I was. A part I cherish most is being able to pick up where we left off and the bond that was created over 50 years ago. There is no stronger bond. We were all we had back then. We depended on one another, and we fought for one another. To reflect on that friendship in person made all our hearts happy.

The Gold Star families also needed this memorial. There were countless of questions answered in which families at the time had no clue what their loved ones were thinking about in the final weeks of their lives. I met one Gold Star family that traveled a long way just to meet one person that knew their son. That speaks volumes as to what this event meant for the Gold Star families in attendance that they would travel halfway across the country to have the opportunity to meet one person that knew the person they missed most.

The Never Forgotten 34 memorial exceeded my expectations. It was well planned, and the location was great. A wellplanned weekend was able to cultivate an environment for families to talk and share their experiences with one another. This is what the Gold Star families deserved, and I believe that all boxes were checked.

I would like to see more events planned like this which allows the family members opportunities to interact with those that knew the Never Forgotten 34. The younger generation needs to know what true sacrifice looks like and the best way to capture that is hearing stories of how things were and the brave souls that fought for our freedom. I think it's a way to bring history out of a book and hear it firsthand on the political climate at the time as well. We can learn a lot by knowing the past so that we can appreciate the present and future sacrifices that others are making or will make.

A common question during job interviews is: "Where do you see yourself in five years?" Although I always thought this was just to see how the prospective employee would react, I believe it's a pertinent question for the Angry Skippers Association. As Wolf Kutter mentions in his eloquent foreword to *Walking Point*, we are not only losing brothers every year, but those of us who are still around are not as active or capable as we once were.

Facing these and other challenges, we must ask ourselves what is our longerterm objective and how can we achieve it? While seeking input and suggestions from all of you, I suggest as a starting point this basic thought: **We want to sustain our**

brotherhood of common experience in a singular era while passing the torch of remembrance to those who follow.

We are a unique group that served in Vietnam with D/2/8 Infantry, 1st Cavalry Division during a one-year assignment between 1965 and 1972. We have been fortunate for many years in having the first necessary organizational condition; that of having a core of willing, experienced, and capable brothers in arms who are devoted to each other and the mission of the Angry Skippers Association. Among our number we have had planners who solicited ASA member consensus and have done the legwork in planning reunions and other events. The standout among us is Robin Woo. Other major players include Ed Regan, Wolf Kutter, Bob Burke, Rich O'Brien and many others as well as those who live in each host city, check out accommodations and complete other preparations for their ASA brothers, friends, and families. Besides Robin, those stepping up to plate for our 2023 reunion in Phoenix include Chuck Hustedt, Michael Martin, Tom McGeogh, and Tom Vollmar.

As we age and our heavy-lifting members pass on or are no longer able to accomplish as much as before, we need to find additional sources of muscle mass and energy to sustain us and continue our mission of brotherhood and remembrance.

One idea is to reemphasize assistance and involvement from our families and supporters, many of whom have joined us at our reunions over the years. In many cases, they have witnessed the significance of what we sacrificed and accomplished as brothers in arms and have come to understand the bond we share. As our wives, children, and significant others, they have participated in our individual journeys of homecoming, reintegration, and recovery from our battlefield experiences. Some of them continue to dress our wounds to this day. I believe many of these people would be only too happy to help our organization as it moves into the future. Encouraging them to become Associate Members with a real role to play in our future would be, as Wolf suggests, a positive and powerful move forward.

A second idea is to build on outreach to KIA next of kin and the wealth of energy and heart we witnessed among the Never Forgotten 34 families. Many who attended the 2022 memorial in DC had no previous contact with us. For myself, it was moving to talk to a daughter who, as a child, lost her father in the Chinook crash in 1972 and wanted to know more about him; a scenario repeated with others several times during the reunion. We are the last living contacts with brothers lost in the 1972 accident or killed in action since D/2/8 Infantry arrived in Vietnam in 1965. Survivors of ASA members who died should also be included among those we embrace with enthusiasm and compassion.

I welcome your suggestions on additional measures to expand and sustain our brotherhood of arms, the memories of those lost, and outreach to those who will sustain and support our mission of brotherhood and remembrance.
